A **unique event** is coming to our Church on Sunday, <u>September 27th at 4:00 p.m.</u> If you enjoy listening to **Jenny Bower** perform her magic at the console of our historic 1879 Hook & Hastings Tracker organ every Sunday, this can't be beat. This organ recital will fill the Sanctuary



with Baroque interpretations of Bach, Buxtehude, Froberger and more for an hour plus. All free-will donations will go toward creating a fund to help give local youth access to musical instruments and share the sound with our community into the future. Checks are tax deductible and offerings will be collected during the program. **Pass the word.** The Church can seat 250!

A bit more about Jenny. Her love of the keyboard began around age 4 in a free-for-all class for preschoolers. At one time her father, who loves music, was a piano salesman. He passed on his passion to her. She started playing the organ in high school at her mother's church, then honed her talents at Oberlin for six years where she studied with James David Christie, one of the founding fathers of the modern historical performance movement. She began specializing in historical organs (over piano) in her third year and took advantage of the

several replica Tracker organs on campus. One had to be pumped by hand during a concert! She also traveled to Germany for a month and sharpened her expertise on instruments from the 17th and 18th centuries. After graduating in 2013, she stayed on an extra year to get a Master of Music in Historical Performance. As she said in her bio in Connections, November 2014, "I am especially interested in historic mechanical-action organs, because they have a lot of personality as instruments. Because of the way the pipes

A Little Breakfast History

So, on the second Saturday of each month a good sized group of Congregational women filled tables in the back room at the Country Kitchen in Ferrisburgh. On one particularly snowy morning, only one hearty soul made the trek and later reported she was treated like Queen for a Day by Sue and all her staff.

The passing years have seen many changes. We've become co-ed! I believe **Bill Bower** may have been the first to "break the barrier." He and Helen often brought Bill's mother, who we enjoyed so much. We've also seen numerous changes in meeting places. Venues, in addition to the long departed Country Kitchen, have included Screwy Louie's (remember it?), the Hungry Bear, and Three Squares (or its predecessor). Finally we settled on Rosie's in Middlebury, at least for now.

PASTOR'S LETTER: On the Way

Jesus, while traveling "on the way" with his disciples asked them: "Who do people say that I am?" He followed that question with another more personal one: "But who do YOU say that I am?" (Mark 8:27-29)

This idea of perceived identity was very important to Jesus as he moved through life with is disciples, preparing them for a time when they would be without his physical presence. The question of identity is also very important to a church (the body of Christ) as it moves through its life.

The Next Level Team (Paul Vachon, Rich Strum, Sharon O'Daniel, Kathleen Cote, Alex McGuire and Kitty Oxholm) have been, over the past year, looking at and acting on aspects of our life together as a church, especially as we grow in our vitality and ministries and be an active and faithful part of Jesus' presence in the world. One stumbling block is that, being good Congregationalists, we have not been able to name an "owned" identity, one which we can claim for ourselves and share with others. Unlike some faith traditions that have a top-down approach to things, where a Pope or a Bishop or a Pastor will declare for the church what it is, we depend upon the Congregation to work toward a definition. The Team has been working with our church consultant, Claire Bamberg, from the Center for Progressive Renewal, to address this need. To that end, the Next Level Team will be inviting the Church to attend one of three gatherings during the week of October 11th – October 17th. Carolyn Tatlock has agreed to facilitate these gatherings and, together with the Team and Claire, we will determine the most effective way for individual voices to be heard. We seek to develop a concise, accurate and invitational identity of who we are, knowing that we cannot be all things to all people. As details unfold, more information will follow.

I am excited about this process of "together" work to discern and declare an identity as one special part of the body of Christ. I also am pleased that this process will be focused and time-limited as we wrestle with the questions: Who do people say we are? And who do YOU say we are?

A crew of painters scraped, primed, and painted every bit of white trim on the Church and the steeple, including the sky blue ceiling of the steeple. Trustees completed annual lead maintenance practices and cleaning at Evergreen Preschool. In addition, we are very close to completing work on a long term (5 year) lease agreement for rental of the first floor of the Manse.
